## GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The area resurveyed within T. 39 N., R. 52 E., varies from mountainous in the south and east portion to nearly level in the north and west portion with the remaining being gently rolling. The elevation ranges from about 5,700 to 7,400 ft. above sea level. The soil varies from sandy clay loam and rocky on the higher elevations to black loam on the bottom land. The vegetation consists of sagebrush, meadow grass and other sparse native grass. There are scattered willow and cottonwood trees along Taylor Canyon Creek which crosses the township in a northwesterly course.

Mining operations were noted in sections 12 and 14. The principal users of the township are cattlemen.

Nevada State Highway No. 226 enters the township in section 24 and exits in section 3. Further access is provided by numerous desert trail roads.
