	<p style="text-align: center;">GENERAL DESCRIPTION</p> <p>The area surveyed and resurveyed within T. 29 N., R. 58 E., varies from mountainous in the west portion to nearly level in the east portion with the remaining terrain being gently rolling. There are numerous small creeks that drain into Franklin Lake to the east. The soil varies from sandy clay loam and rocky on the higher elevations to black loam on the bottom land. The vegetation consist of sagebrush, buckbrush, rabbitbrush, meadow grass and other native grass. There are scattered patches of mountain mahogany, scrub juniper, pinion pine and quaking aspens in the higher elevations.</p> <p>Access to the area is a well maintained county road, that runs along the base of the Ruby mountains. A power line runs along this road. There are also several ranches along the east side of this road.</p>
