Set a steel fence post, 5<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> ft. long, alongside the stainless steel post.

From this corner, the standard <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> sec. cor. of sec. 31, T. 41 N., R. 63 E., hereinbefore described, bears S. 89°08' E., 1.905 chs. dist.

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GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The area surveyed within Township 40<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> North, Range 63 East, varies from rolling to mountainous land. The elevation ranges from about 6,000 to 6,800 ft. above sea level. The soil varies from sandy clay, gravelly and rocky on the higher elevations to black loam on the bottom land. The vegetation consists of sagebrush and native grass. There are scattered stands of willow along the Thousand Springs Creek, which crosses through section 33, in a north northeasterly course.

The Union Pacific Railroad bed crosses through section 33, from SSW. to NNE.

Principal users of the area are cattlemen and access into the township is provided by several unimproved desert trail roads.

No mineral formations of consequence were noted during the survey.

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
