	GENERAL DESCRIPTION
	The portion of the township that was resurveyed is located near the end of the Leonard Creek improved gravel road on the east side of the Black Rock Range. The elevation varies from 4600 to 5400 feet above sea level. The terrain is rolling to mountainous. There are several sources of water coming out of canyons located westerly of the resurveyed area. The principal water source is Paiute Creek (formerly spelled "Pahute") which enters the township near the NW. cor. of sec. 1, flows in an easterly direction and exits around the E $^{1}$ / $_{4}$ cor. of sec. 1. The soil is predominately clay to very rocky in the mountainous areas. Vegetation consists mostly of sagebrush with scattered shadscale, rabbitbrush, Brigham tea, cacti and native grass. Willows are found along the water courses.
	Access is limited to a few trail roads found principally in the canyons. There are several springs in the NE <sup>1</sup> / <sub>4</sub> of sec. 13 as shown on U.S.G.S. quadrangle map "PAIUTE MEADOWS, NEV." The principal users of the area are hunters and ranchers. No mineral formations of any consequence were noted during the course of the resurvey.
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
