Beginning at the $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. just described I run West on the west half bet. secs. 2 and 11. 71.60 Top of main mountain range, bears N. and S., 8000 ft. alt., desc. 87.32 After diligent search I find no trace of the cor. of secs. 2, 3, 10 and 11.
Build temp. cor. at this point which is a mound of rock 3 ft. base, 2 ft. high. Beginning at the temp. cor. for secs. 2, 3, 10 and 11, I run South on a random line bet. secs. 10 and 11. Asc. over rough mountainous land. Top of main mountain ridge, bears NE. and SW., desc. 15.00 The line runs along the east edge of the top of the range. Leave top of range, bears to SE., desc. Gully, 20 lks. wide, course W., asc. Find no trace of the old $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor., build temp. $\frac{1}{4}$ cor. 32.00 35.30 40.00 small mound of stone and continue line S. Top of spur, bears E. and W., desc. Gully, 30 lks. wide, course W., asc. Top of spur, bears E. and W. 46.00 62.50 75.20 84.60 Intersect a point 99 lks. W. of the cor. of secs. 10, 11, 14 and 15. Course of this mile is S.0°40'E. May 24, 1913.

In the execution of the retracement of the above described lines I have found 17 of the original cors. out of 25 looked for, while the distances and alinement are in most cases out of limits, the corners found are well marked and in a good state of preservation.

There are old cors. enough in the district to enable

a surveyor to establish the missing ones by means of a restoration survey, if necessary. With the present number of original cors. in the district, all secs. in question can be readily identified. In every case where I have found the old cors. I have put up lath with white flags attacked and have also flagged the lines on the ter flags attached and have also flagged the lines on the tops of spurs in the same manner.

Secs. 10, 11 and 15, also secs. 1 and 2 contain indications of considerable mineral, and many mineral locations.
